

THE NATIONAL LEVEL FOCUS

At the national level there are four priority issues that UMW units everywhere will be striving to affect change for the next four years https://www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/issues):

- 1. Criminalization of Communities of Color: Interrupt the school-to-prison pipeline
- 2. Climate Justice: Reduce carbon footprint emissions of corporations and individuals
- 3. Economic Inequality: Adopt legislation in states/localities that builds the base for a living wage
- 4. Maternal and Child Health: Decrease maternal mortality; develop a network of women's health advocates for access to health care and education

With the national issues comes a lot of supportive material that can be used at the local level. However, there are four local concerns that have come to my attention as I've interacted with district unit membership. Below I will present these issues, and ask for your response in an effort to create supportive materials for you regarding *What are current groups doing?*

FOUR LOCAL CHALLENGES

#1 GROWTH & RECRUITMENT

We are getting older, and younger members are not joining us in sufficient numbers to sustain the organization long term. So, how can local units be successful in recruiting younger women?

And related to this . . . how can we support older members of smaller units who are individually doing more with less and getting burnt out just keeping up with historical commitments? Yet, if they pull back due to lack of resources or simple lack of physical energy, they become even less visible to their congregations and communities. What adaptations/accommodations can be made in the face of decreasing membership?

YOUR RESPONSE: Please send me your best recruitment idea and most successful accommodation for smaller groups with older members. Example: change a dine-in fund raising dinner to take-out only because take-out is an operation that can be run by fewer people.

#2 THE IMPACT OF COVID

How can we be effective at what we do during a pandemic – when we cannot do what we do best: nurture relationships!?! How can we do life together when we can't **be** together?

Also related is: . . . how do we deal with the limits of technology or bridge the technology gap?

Zoom is great for the technically savvy, but what about the technologically challenged or those with limited access for whatever reason? Also, some have mentioned that Zoom isn't really satisfying -- technology hasn't really replaced being together. What if unit membership is "Zoomed out"?

YOUR RESPONSE: Please send me one amazing way your unit maintains connections in addition to checking in with phone calls, sending notes and cards and emails, doing Facebook posts, or door drops . . . tell us your amazing idea we don't yet know about! (Even if you think we do know about it!)

#3 NEED FOR RESOURCES (This one is 4-fold.)

a) Personal/Spiritual Growth materials. Local units also requested resources for monthly devotions. (Inspirational stories or spiritual growth materials like a video series with study guides and discussion questions needing only a facilitator (instead of a teacher) were popular.)

YOUR RESPONSE: Send me a link to (or a description of) your most helpful and inspiring encounter with devotional or study materials. Share what has profoundly impacted your unit.

Spiritual Growth (con't)

b) Speakers/Presenter. A list of special speakers or presenters has been requested — a list of those willing to speak at a local unit meeting or at a special UMW local event like a Saturday morning breakfast gathering. Many units feel they need an infusion of "new blood" or at least some "cross pollination" to help refresh and revitalize.

YOUR RESPONSE: Are you willing to share your area of expertise or special experience? Or if you know of an outstanding person, please pass on their names and contact information to me.

c) Best Practices. The creation of some kind of a curated online sharing space where individuals and units could share best practices - "what worked for them" organized by subject. (Something to do with Google and post-it notes is in the works - stay tuned!)

YOUR RESPONSE: If you have discovered an exceptional way of doing something, or an impressive event, or unusual way to meet a need, or a "remarkable anything" that worked for you . . . PLEASE SHARE!

d) Fundraising Ideas. ALL UNITS asked for creative fundraising ideas – they are open to anything that could safely raise money during a pandemic.

YOUR RESPONSE: If you have developed a unique way to raise resources, please let me know what you did and how you did it! I will pass it on.

#4. REVISITING, REINVENTING, OR REIMAGINING US

Finally, even though younger women love the mission focus of the UMW, they feel our meeting structure doesn't work for them. Younger women mentioned how packed their plates already are and how they struggle with work-life balance – how multiple responsibilities leave little "me time". With so little discretionary time, outside activities are carefully weighed for meaning and matching of life goals. So, in what form do we offer spiritual refreshing and invigorating service opportunities?

Some units have shifted from a monthly meeting to a weekend breakfast gathering with a speaker, or a gathering around a service learning project, or a gathering that takes on a different form each time. Some do "housekeeping" communications electronically rather than in person. Some units resemble a class or small group. Others do a bigger quarterly event instead of meeting monthly. I quote one comment: "I believe we can and must continue to advocate for women, youth, and children – as long as we exist, but how do we make sure we continue to exist?"

YOUR RESPONSE: Think about your unit's "modus operandi" . . . are we willing to revisit, reinvent, or reimagine when and how UMW units gather? Will your unit brainstorm and send me a couple of ideas to share next time?

I know as you read these, ideas came to your mind, so, before life distracts you, pull out your phone or sit down at your computer and tell me about them. Do not trust your memory or deceive yourself into believing you'll do this later. As the old Nike ad says JUST DO IT! Help our local units with the answers within you! Let's build up the body of women called UMW whose mission is so vital.

In the weeks before Easter, a song kept running through my head, an occurrence known as having an "ear worm". It happens to lots of people, but it happens to this old music teacher a lot. "Run, Come, See" were the words that would not go away. It took a long time to locate the song book with the complete text. After I found the song in the green book I had pictured, I remembered that I had taught the song to the church children's choir decades ago. The children and I acted out the Easter story of the rolled-away stone, a sitting angel, telling others of the empty tomb, shouting for joy. Each Gospel version of the resurrection is different. Jesus greets a weeping Mary in one, but he is not seen at the tomb in another. The disciples run away in fear in a different telling. In Luke's gospel, the men don't believe what the women say they saw. Peter checked out the tomb on his own, seeing only the linen cloth, returned home "wondering what had happened". (CEB)

Who are we in these versions of the Easter narratives? 

This 2022 Reading program list will include new books from the following areas: Education for Mission, Leadership Development, Nurturing for Community, Spiritual Growth, Social Action, Children's Books, and Youth Books. The book I would like to Spotlight in this article is entitled *GumMoon: A Novel of San Francisco Chinatown*. This book , written by Jeffrey L. Staley and based on a true story, is found in the category of Education for Mission. In 1898, three-year-old Chinese-American Mei Chun Lai is sold to a brothel keeper, where a sympathetic prostitute befriends her. Two years later, at the height of a plague quarantine, a young Methodist woman rescues Chun and places her in a home for abused and trafficked girls. The home is destroyed in the 1906 San Francisco earthquake and fire. Chun (aka Maud) and a group of seven other Chinese children embark on a cross-country tour to raise funds to rebuild. When the matron of the home suffers a break-down, 13-year-old Maud must lead the band of children home.

A personal reflection on this book "This was a very inspiring story to read and contemplate the strength and perseverance of Maud and many others in her life."






Treasurer
