



A package sat on the counter in my church office, addressed to Ypsilanti Untied Methodist Church. It was humorous at first, a simple typo. But was it no error at all? Was it a God wink – a statement about the way things are?

At the time when my husband, Jim, and I were married, back in the 60's, the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church were considering merging. Eventually the merger took place and the new denomination became the United Methodist Church. Jim and I joked that we rushed the merger. I have always been impressed and influenced by Jim's concern for justice for all people and his openness to all, thinking it was a result of his extensive education, especially in history. He was fond of quoting the old adage, author unknown, "He

drew a circle that shut me out, heretic, rebel, a thing to flout. But love and I had the wit to win. We drew a circle that took him in."

Years later I accompanied Jim to a reunion at the Evangelical Theological Seminary (now part of Garrett) from which he had graduated. I listened to his fellow seminarians talk about how their church had influenced and encouraged them to be socially active and concerned for all God's people. It made me realize I had it wrong. It was the church from whence Jim developed his attitude. Now I wonder if those former EUB's are thinking they should never have merged with the Methodist Church. What are they thinking about this untied situation?

What do we as United Methodist Women do in this untied context? Surely the uncertainty about what is going to happen within our denomination has to spill over into uncertainty about United Methodist Women, in the thoughts and prayers of women other than me. And we know there are no simple answers. But the need for our work of mission and social justice for the world is still so strong. In our own country "43% of Americans ages 18-65 are low-wage workers with a median income of less than \$18,000 a year" (The Nation, December 16/23, 2019). Try living on that! Some economic recovery, right? Draw your circle around those low paid workers and feel their pain. In the recent issue of *Sojourners* magazine, editor Jim Wallis writes, "... going back to Jesus is the only way forward..." His context is different but it's a good mantra for us in our situation. Let Jesus be your guide as you draw your circles. Let Jesus be your guide as we move forward!

As I write this, Martin Luther King Jr. Day is coming up and I'm pleased to see that racial justice is taking a more prominent place in our news cycles.

I attended a program at the Ann Arbor Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church on *Promoting Social Justice Through Voting*. The message from our panelists was for us to *get out the vote*.

Did vou know...

- Students can now vote in their own college community.
- Michigan now has no-reason absentee voting.
- · You can register on election day.
- Felons can vote in Michigan if they are not incarcerated.
- First-generation immigrant communities may come from a country where the government is not trustworthy, and they may be less likely to participate in elections. They are also more susceptible to conspiracy theories.
- The League of Women Voters is an excellent resource.

Our host reminded us that we all have individual power. Even while we celebrate the legacy of MLK Jr, let us remember that there were numerous unnamed persons who participated in civil rights work.

By gathering info from more than one source, inviting candidates to speak to our groups, asking trusted friends or family for their opinions on candidates and issues, and offering to drive others to the polls, we can do our part to make the upcoming election successful. Our panelists stressed that human relationships are the best way to empower others.

It's also important for us to have a good census count in Michigan. \$700 Billion of federal dollars are distributed annually based on the census. Our state may lose a member in the federal House of Representatives if our population continues to drop with respect to other states. The census counts all persons living in the U.S. and there is no citizenship question on the ballot. Responses are confidential by law and there's a hefty financial penalty for anyone who discloses private information! If you are looking for employment or know someone who is, they have lots of jobs to fill and the pay is good.

Making sure others know that they count is a step toward creating belonging and the beloved community!
