A REFLECTION – SPIRIT OF THE LIVING GOD

As we enter a time in the year where we are encouraged to give thanks, receive the Christmas message once again, and contemplate how 2022 will be different from 2021, the words of the hymn, *Spirit of the Living God*, come to mind. This is a prayer and the request is that the Spirit of the Living God fall afresh on us.



As we approach the time of Christmas, we might pray this as we hope to experience the wonder of the Gift that is Jesus in a more profound way. As we enter the New Year, we may want this to be a year that brings us closer to God and more open to serving in a more devoted or invigorating way. We may think of this when we see a new snowfall and marvel at how everything looks different and clean. We ask the Spirit to fall on us in a way that makes us new as the snow does our surroundings. How might we set the stage for this “freshness” to happen?

Perhaps we can renew our commitment to a time of devotional reading and prayer each day. Some find that starting the day with a quiet time sets the tone for the remainder of the day. Others may find that it is better for them to do this when they are more fully awake. Maybe you choose to end your day this way. What to do?

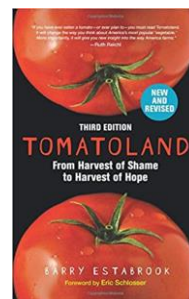
Find a devotional guide that speaks to you. Perhaps it is the *Upper Room*. The scripture reading suggested along with the personal story brings a contemporary, relatable message. It may be a resource you find online. Many pastors offer daily devotions there. Ask another person what resource they have found helpful. There are likely guides in your church library as well. This is a good place to identify authors who speak to your heart and mind. Develop a process that works for you. Do you play music or light a candle? Do you choose to read first and then enter a time of prayer? Do you include a Psalm as a reading or a prayer? Look at a hymnal and center yourself on the message in the words of a selection. When your heart and mind are calmed, pour yourself out to God. Then allow some quietness so you can “hear” a message meant for you.

Ask yourself what the words “Spirit of the Living God fall afresh on me” mean to you. I pray that you will experience the Spirit of the Living God refreshing you and energizing for the work you are called to more fully in the seasons ahead.

TOMATOES!

As a former farm girl who has lived in the city for the last 42 years, I am still very interested in how our food is grown. My small garden always has at least a couple of tomato plants in the summer that produce the best tasting tomatoes and cherry tomatoes. My granddaughter loves to eat them right from the plant when she visits. I don't have to worry about the safety of the fruit because we grow them organically and know what goes into each bite of the juicy goodness.



After reading *Tomatoland: How Modern Industrial Agriculture Destroyed Our Most Alluring Fruit* by Barry Estabrook, a Social Action book on our Reading Program List for 2021-2022, I will now always have second thoughts about any tomatoes not grown in my own garden. The book reports the widespread use of herbicides and pesticides not only makes the fruit less nutritious, but also creates an unsafe environment for slave market workers who are forced to plant, weed and harvest the tomatoes often causing serious and life-threatening illnesses and birth defects. The tomatoes are picked when they are green, trucked all over the US and then gassed to make them turn red. There is so much more evidence in the book that agribusiness in the US has ruined this once magical fruit.

This book really made me see that buying fruits and vegetables in season from local producers is really still the best way. I'll stick to tomatoes from my own garden but I hope you'll read this enlightening book and decide for yourself!

A STEP BACK IN TIME INSPIRES A STEP FORWARD FOR RACIAL JUSTICE

Last month, I was able to participate in the Civil Rights Tour to Memphis, Birmingham, Montgomery, and Selma with many other United Methodist Women, a few men, and several people from other denominations. It was an eye-opening trip, and I am thankful to Nancy Snell from Westwood UMC for organizing it. We confronted the painful history



of enslavement, segregation, Reconstruction, convict leasing, lynching, Jim Crow, and the fight for equal rights. We talked to people there and listened to their stories. We returned from our trip determined to work for racial justice for all.

The trip began in Memphis with a visit to the National Civil Rights Museum & Lorraine Motel (where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was shot), and a Heritage Tour of the city, which included a visit to a home that had been part of the Underground Railroad. Our tour guide, Elaine Turner, was a Director for the Slave Haven Underground Railroad Museum. Elaine shared with us about her participation in protests during the 1960's. She and her sisters were arrested 17 times, earning them the title of "Most Arrested Civil Rights Family"!

The next day, we went to Birmingham, Alabama, where we visited the Bethel Baptist Church (Rev. Shuttlesworth's church), the 16th Baptist Church (where the four young girls were killed by a bomb blast in 1963), the Kelly Ingram Park, and the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute. The following day was spent in Montgomery, where we visited the Legacy Museum, the Civil Rights Memorial at the Southern Poverty Law Center, the National Memorial for Peace and Justice and Wall of Tears, and the Rosa Parks Freedom Rides Museum. Our final stop was in Selma, where we visited the Interpretive Center, listened to "foot soldier" Annie Pearl Avery, and then walked across the famous Edmund Pettis Bridge, where we remembered John Lewis and the events of Bloody Sunday.

If any of your units would like to hear more about this trip, I would be happy to come and share. As you know, the United Methodist Women is deeply committed to the ongoing work of racial justice; one of the two social action campaigns for the 2021 – 2024 quadrennium is about the Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration. I would love to visit your local unit and talk with you about what you can do.
